His computer skills are a bonus and have been essential in starting the Zoom services during the pandemic and continuing them since. Music director, Melissa Stephens, the choir and other musical guests add another dimension to our worship services.

1. NOMINATIONS FOR CHAIR AND SECRETARY: Rev. Max Ward asked for nominations for chair and secretary.

Motion: Marybeth Wilson/Debbie Sherwin moved and seconded that Janet Heffer be chair and Rebekah Chevalier be secretary. **Carried.**

2. Rev. Max opened the meeting in prayer.

3. REVIEW OF ZOOM PROTOCOLS

Rev. Max Ward highlighted the online procedures to be used for speaking and voting, etc.

4. IN MEMORIAM (Annual Report p. 21)

Rev. Max reviewed the list of names of those who passed away in 2022 and led in a time of remembrance followed by a moment of silence. Joan Barnes was added to the list in the Annual Report.

5. WELCOME

Janet Heffer thanked everyone for participating and asked for patience as we meet in this hybrid fashion.

6. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Motion: Erskine Flook/ Jane Symons that the agenda be approved. **Carried.**

7. ADHERENTS VOTING

Motion: Penni Chalk/ Lois Deacon that adherents be allowed to vote on all matters as stated in *The Manual*. **Carried.**

8. APPROVAL OF MINUTES of Highland Hills Pastoral Charge and Highland Hills United Church (HHUC) Annual General Meeting Feb. 13, 2022 (Annual Report pp. 6-9)

Motion: Ron Clark/ Barbara Walford-Davis that the pastoral charge and HHUC AGM minutes be approved. **Carried**.

9. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

All items either appear in the agenda already or in the annual report.

10. DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL OF HIGHLAND HILLS PASTORAL CHARGE 2022 FINANCIAL ACTUALS AND BUDGET 2023 (Annual Report pp. 11-13)

Erskine Flook spoke to this. He started with the Pastoral Charge report, page 11. 76 percent of pastoral charge money spent is for the salary of the minister and the church administrator, which is fixed by the national United Church. The manse costs are 8%, running the office is 5%, and denominational assessment is about 6%. This leaves about 2%. Under actuals 2022 the biggest item is a result of the closure of Maple Lake United whose contribution of 14% of the costs did not materialize. We kept the amount that HHUC remitted by drawing down from the bank account. When we look at the budget for next year, we need to consider this. Office supplies are up due to mailings. Office equipment includes purchase of a safe for documents and a new printer. In manse costs fuel is a factor.

Regarding the 2023 budget, a 3.4% salary increase is the main increase and the rest are basically the same as last year. There was \$6,000 in the pastoral charge bank account at year end. Rev. Max's work at Hope United Church is not shown because it is still a trial but money received will build up the church bank account to \$10,000. A question was asked about how much we made or lost; the answer is there was a shortfall of \$5,000. This comes from the loss of Maple Lake United contributions and increased expenses. The projected potential income from Hope United is \$10,000. Rev. Max's expenses come out of Hope's budget. In answer to question, it was noted that the \$5,000 in miscellaneous income is from an individual's donation. A question was asked of whether we will be moving to one budget rather than currently two (one for pastoral charge and one for Highland Hills). Two budgets will continue for a year until all the things related to Maple Lake are wound up.

Motion: Erskine Flook/ Neil Darby that we accept the pastoral charge 2022 financials and the proposed budget for Highland Hills Pastoral Charge for 2023. **Carried.**

11. HIGHLAND HILLS PASTORAL CHARGE REPORTS (Annual Report pp. 14-22)

Motion: Chris Archer/ Brian Austen that the pastoral charge reports be accepted. **Carried.** A Question was asked as to whether the finance committee is setting aside money for the lift. The answer is no, there is building fund money and capital fund money available. This will be discussed further later in the meeting.

12. APPROVAL OF MISSION & SERVICE OBJECTIVE (Annual Report p. 15)

It was recommended that the M&S objective be \$14,000 for the congregation and that the UCW objective be \$1,000. Thus \$15,000 is the charge's objective.

Motion: Pat Thornett/ Barbara Walford-Davis that the total objective for the pastoral charge be \$15,000 with \$14,000 from the congregation and \$1,000 from UCW. **Carried.**

13. ELECTION OF HIGHLAND HILLS PASTORAL CHARGE AND CHURCH OFFICERS (Annual Report, p. 16)

It was noted that this meeting is only electing the officers and the rest is shown for information. Committee chairs are fluid and can change as needed.

Motion: Ron Clark/ Neil Darby that the proposed slate of officers be approved. **Carried.**

HIGHLAND HILLS UNITED CHURCH

14. HIGHLAND HILLS UNITED CHURCH 2022 FINANCIAL ACTUALS AND 2023 BUDGET (Annual Report pp. 24-29)

Erskine Flook spoke to this. On p. 24, line 4010, general income (weekly givings) after the report was written, more donations were received. This addition was \$840.79% of the budget for the church is our remittance to the pastoral charge. 12% is the cost of running the building. 8% is the cost of music and janitorial services. The weekly givings budget has been increased by \$5,000 for 2023. There is a desire for members and adherents to increase their givings by 10%. A question was asked about people from Maple Lake United transferring their membership to Highland Hills United and whether their additional givings will offset some of the shortfall from the closure of Maple Lake United, but the answer is not by much. The hope is there will be more rentals this year. But we are going to depend on accessing monies from the trustees to balance the budget. Page 29 shows our financial position. Bruce McClennan noted that we are gradually moving our investments from CIBC to Canaccord. People were requested to consider increasing their donations and also going on pre-authorized remittance (PAR) if they are not already.

There was a question about advertising and where it is being recorded. It is recorded under the pastoral charge. There was a question about the money spent on the kitchen, can it be claimed as a capital expense? The answer is no, only the HST can be claimed. The Kitchen Fund was only set up to capture money donated for the kitchen renovations. All those donations were applied to the renovations and the shortfall was covered by money from the Building Fund. Bruce McClennan noted that as we take money from the investment account to cover any shortfall, it generates less income. He noted that regarding the money for the lift, it will be closer to \$100,000. This will take a sizeable chunk out of investments if we don't do anything else. He said we should be looking at fundraising for the lift, and this is a matter the Board should address. Erskine was thanked for his hard work and dedication.

15. APPROVAL OF HIGHLAND HILLS UNITED CHURCH BUDGET FOR 2023

Motion: Erskine Flook/ Brian Austen that the 2022 financials and the 2023 operating budget for Highland Hills United Church be approved. **Carried.**

16. APPROVAL OF SIGNING AUTHORITY FOR BANK ACCOUNTS

Motion: Erskine Flook/ Sue Sisson that the signing authority for Highland Hills Pastoral Charge bank account at TD Canada Trust and for Highland Hills United Church's bank account at CIBC shall be as follows. **Carried.**

Treasurer of the Unified Board (or delegate): Erskine Flook and any one of the following: Chair of the Unified Board (Janet Heffer); Chair-elect of the Unified Board (vacant); Past Chair of the Unified Board (Andy Cooper); Chair of the Board of Trustees of Highland Hills United Church (Bruce McClennan). It was agreed that Pat Thornett temporarily be added given that there is no chair-elect and the past chair has moved away.

17. HIGHLAND HILLS UNITED CHURCH REPORTS (Annual Report pp. 29-32)

Concern was expressed about some issues related to the inside of the building, such as chunks of plaster and the windowsill of the big window rotting. Also on the outside ramp, non-slip material needs to be added. Can some money be set aside for this for this year? Regarding fundraising for the lift, Donna Darby said she would like suggestions. Would a dinner, in person or takeout, or a concert be effective, for example? It was noted that the UCW is planning a takeout dinner before Easter.

Motion: Rebekah Chevalier/ Donna Darby that the Highland Hills United Church reports be approved. **Carried.**

18. NEW BUSINESS

Lift Update: There is an update in the annual report (p. 30). Neil Darby said they have drawings from the architect and an application to obtain a building permit is in hand though not yet submitted because the committee would like to be clear on the timeline and the contractor. The architect has been paid for his drawings. They are working on a scope of work for a contractor. 6 months to a year is the current timeline for delivery of the large apparatus. There will need to be some reconfiguring of the basement storage area. In the interim, people who have material in the storage area will be informed as to what will happen with the material. Bruce showed where the lift will be going physically in the basement. Upstairs in the sanctuary the lift door will open toward the doors of the church and have a child-proof gate. Ductwork in the basement will need to be reconfigured. The lift will take up to 3 people. It was clarified that it is our turn to hold the UCW rally, likely on June 15, and there will be people in all parts of the building. Neil and Bruce and Erskine were thanked for their work on this.

Hope United: Shawn Chevalier spoke to this. (p. 14 in the annual report). We have entered into an agreement with Hope United Church in Norland so that Rev. Max will lead worship twice a month for a trial of the first six months of this year. Hope will pay HH pastoral charge a fee for each week he does this and will pay Rev. Max mileage. In addition, Rev. Max will be the pastoral charge supervisor. Hope will compensate him directly for any time he spends on this, in addition to weddings and funerals. It bolsters our finances and helps another United Church thrive. This arrangement will be evaluated in May.

19. CHAIR'S REMARKS and APPRECIATIONS

Janet Heffer thanked Andy Cooper, outgoing chair. COVID has challenged us all but thanks to Rev. Max we have done well. The introduction of Zoom is a challenge but is working for us. Janet thanked Max, Melissa, Dee, Paul, and Erskine. She thanked Pat for arranging lunch today and does so many things behind the scenes.

East Central Ontario Regional Council (ECORC) Report

ECORC came into existence on January 1, 2019. One of sixteen Regional Councils (RC) of the United Church of Canada, it replaced the former Conferences and Presbyteries. It is a decision-making body responsible to serve and support Communities of Faith within its bounds and to provide necessary oversight. The transition has not been easy with Covid-19, and Networks and Forums are still finding their way.

Did you know that ECORC is Affirming and has an Anti-Racism policy? There is evidence that inclusive language is becoming the norm in the life and work of the church, especially inclusive language and images of God in worship. There is also an increasing use of Land Acknowledgements and more participation in learning opportunities related to Respectful Relations and Indigenous Justice.

The governing body of each pastoral charge has a right and responsibility to vote on **Remit 1: Establishing an Autonomous National Indigenous Organization**. Information and resources, including recorded information sessions, can be found on the ECORC website (**ecorcuccan.ca**) at the Indigenous Justice & Respectful Relationships Forum. Voting must occur by March 31, 2024. **Our Unified Board recently voted in favour of the remit.**

The number of church buildings in our RC that are accessible continues to increase. Highland Hills United Church is demonstrating faithful stewardship of its property and finances with its lift campaign.

Events are held every year related to outreach and social justice within our RC. They take place in a variety of geographic locations within the Region. Rev. Max Ward, Rev. Marybeth Wilson, Janet Heffer, Debbie Sherwin and Katy Cox attended the inspiring presentation, facilitated by the Moderator, the Right Rev. Dr. Carmen Lansdowne, in Kingston on November 10, 2023. We reflected on what it means to flourish in a post-Covid world, and how individuals and communities flourish and thrive, instead of simply survive. More details will be forthcoming on the **Flourishing Project: Bold Ideas Daring Connections**.

Several regional networks have been formed recently. If you are passionate about the KAIROS movement, **Guaranteed Liveable Income** (GLI), the network is a source of information, inspiration, and support for Communities of Faith who wish to be a part of this national grassroots move of the spirit. The **Very Rev. Lois Wilson will address this network via Zoom on March 23, 2024, at 7 p.m.**

There's a National and ECORC network for Long-Term Care, and a Care of Creation Network for those who are concerned about our call to be better stewards of creation. The National Church has set climate goals about reducing our greenhouse gas emissions, and our carbon footprints, but there are currently no Communities of Faith working on these goals.

A year-long celebration of the **100**th **anniversary of the United Church of Canada** will begin with a worship service on **June 9, 2024**.

Ministry and Personnel Committee Report

Reverend Max has continued to keep the Committee up to date on his many activities and mileage through quarterly reports.

Recommendations were made to the Official Board regarding Vacation and Study Leave and Salaries for the minister, music director and the church administrator.

Dee Wruth has been with us for over two years now as Church Administrator and has continued to serve the congregation and charge with excellence. Appreciation is warranted for the extra work Dee put into arranging for the successful cookbook fundraiser and the several "fun raiser" events she and Reverend Max organized. Dee has continued to work with Erskine Flook to assist with day-to-day financial tasks.

In July, Reverend Max's 20 years of dedicated service to the Highland Hills Pastoral Charge was acknowledged at a Sunday service. Many thanks to Reverend Max and Melissa Stephens for their continued delivery of excellent ministry and musical services to the pastoral charge throughout the year while juggling many other activities in their busy lives.

The shared ministry agreement with Hope United Church in Norland commenced in January with Reverend Max providing twice-monthly pulpit supply and being their Pastoral Charge Supervisor. The six-month trial period was reviewed at the end of May as a success and was approved by the Unified Board for another six-month extension to December 31st, with an increase in pulpit supply frequency to three Sundays per month, as requested by Hope United Church. Reverend Max supported this arrangement and has demonstrated he was able to capably accommodate these added responsibilities. Reverend Max also participated in the Community Worship Service at the Norland Summer Festival and in the Norland Remembrance service and parade on behalf of Norland United Church and is expecting to participate in these events again in 2024.

At the request of Hope United Church, the shared ministry agreement has again been renewed for the first six-months of 2024 with Reverend Max preaching the equivalent of three Sundays per month. This arrangement will continue to bring much appreciated ministry to the Norland community and financial benefits to Highland Hills Pastoral Charge. We thank Reverend Max for his role in making the shared ministry such a success.

HHPC will receive quarterly payments from Hope United Church in the amount of \$2,500.20 comprised of \$2,223 for pulpit supply plus \$277.20 for Reverend Max's mileage.

The joint HHUC and HUC Ministry & Personnel Committee met on three occasions through the year. The Committee will review the shared ministry agreement prior to the end of April 2024 to assess if another six-month renewal is warranted.

Shawn Chevalier participated in a half day ZOOM Ministry & Personnel Committee Workshop in November led by the pastoral relations ministers from three Regional Councils.

The M&P Committee continues to be available to address any personnel-related concerns of the congregation. They must be submitted in writing. We are here to also address any concerns of the employees of the Pastoral Charge.

Our committee held 6 meetings during the year. In person and Zoom were available for each meeting. In January we set up our projects for the year and planned for the events at meetings as needed.

PROJECTS FOR 2023

February 8 – **Basic Income Event** – Judy Paul lead the 26 participants in learning the concept of Basic Income. There were discussions in small groups and in the whole group. Emily Stonehouse attended and wrote an article for The Times. A committee continues to meet and are planning a Power Point Presentation that will assist in educating individuals & groups.

February 19 – Pink Shirt Day – Rev. Paul Reed spoke about it in the service

March 5 – 26 – YWCA/HERS – Tammy Warburton talked about their work in a service.

April 16 – Earth Day Sunday - Max did the service and it went well.

June – **HAVE Walk for Water** – a group walked on June 28th and raised \$2,295.00.

June 18 - Indigenous Peoples Celebration - Max spoke on it and Father's Day.

July 1 – **Canada Day Outreach Display** – we had pencils and handouts, lemonade and cookies. Donations to M& S totalled \$305.15.

August 6 – **Highland Yard Race for Places for People** – Rotaract ran the event. \$20,000.00 was raised.

July – August – **Haliburton Highlands Challenge for Abbey Retreat Centre** – our team Walking 2 X 2 for ARC was walking again this year and collecting sponsors. We raised \$2,634.00.

Sep. 17 – Oct. 8 – **Thanksgiving Food Bank Drive** - the congregation was invited to donate food or money. The donations went directly to the Minden Community Food Centre so we do not have a total raised.

Sept. 30 – **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation** – We were invited to wear an orange shirt to church on October 1st in support of this cause.

Oct. 15 – Nov. 12 – **Twoonies for M & S** - \$36.00 was raised and given in support of the Wasauksing Food Bank near Parry Sound.

Dec. 3 – Dec. 25 – **Gifts for Hyland Crest** – four local churches took part so we were responsible for 15 gifts. Thanks to Joan Grant for purchasing the gifts and to those who donated for them.

Holiday Hampers – envelopes for this went directly to the Food Bank so no total available. **Gifts with Vision** –you were invited to look at the book or the web site and choose a project.

We receive regular reports from the following groups:

Abbey Retreat Centre_has offered several in person and online courses. Lynda Shephard is their new Chair and Nancy Gosse is Program Coordinator. They have been training new facilitators. Their quilting group "A Warm Hug from the Highlands" has gifted over 75 quilts to people living with cancer. The Haliburton Highlands Challenge was very successful raising over \$80,000.00 for the Abbey Retreat Centre and our team took part.

Broadview Subscriptions – there are now 25 subscriptions for our congregation.

Knitting for Warmth continues to meet at the church under the leadership of Mary Trepanier. They made 79 blankets using 3,167 squares this year. Four new members have joined the group. There are 17 bags of squares at church members homes waiting for the storage cupboard to be finished. Since the group started they have made 2,850 blankets with 94,699 squares.

Minden Community Food Centre saw a large increase in the number of clients. They also were involved in the Holiday Hampers. 170 hampers were prepared with food for Christmas day and toys for almost 200 children. Our Food Bank Manager is Jean Munroe and the Assistant Manager is Lynette Gray. They are assisted by many volunteers in the food bank and community kitchen. They also had a very successful year for the new Community Gardens which are on the Fair Grounds.

Mission & Service - thanks to our donors we exceeded our Objective of \$15,000.00 and raised \$20,365.65.

Many more people can be helped because of your generosity.

Places for People had a challenging year with trying to build at Grass Lake. They had many good events during the year. Sleeping in Cars raised over \$10,000.00. They hosted a Housing Summit in April which was well attended and interesting. The Highland Yard Race raised over \$20,000.00. They worked with Tapestry Capital to organize a Community Bond issue and were able to sell over \$850,000.00 worth. This will allow them to pay off their existing properties and use them for collateral for future needs. Their Window Pane Campaign exceeded its goal of \$15,000.00 which will be used to replace windows in their properties.

Thanks to all who supported Outreach projects with their time or their finances as we could not do them without you.

LIFT UPDATE - January 2023

The lift committee signed the contract and obtained the building permit for the installation of the lift.

Construction commenced in August and as of this writing is still ongoing. The lift is installed but requires some finishing, by both the lift installer and the contractor. Once they are both finished we still need a safety inspection before the lift becomes operational. The committee wishes to thank everyone for the fund-raising endeavours. It is truly outstanding.

Trustees Report

The Trustees continued to manage the long-term financial assets of the Church. The bulk of these assets are with Canaccord Genuity and Bruce, Ross and Erskine meet by phone at least twice per year with the portfolio manager to review the investments. The portfolio consists of GICs, balanced Exchange Traded Funds and preferred shares all with a conservative outlook. Our portfolio stands at essentially the same point it did last year however over the course of the year we have transferred a total of \$40,000 to the HHUC bank account. Our portfolio now includes a \$10,000 Bond with Places for People which has been invested at 4% for 5 years. As GICs have come due this past year, we have been able to reinvest at rates equal to or above 5%.

As this year closes, the Church has entered into discussions with Max and Amanda on selling them the Manse. The United Church of Canada is aware of and encourages these discussions.

Maple Lake United Church Reports

Maple Lake United Church 2023 Update

The Maple Lake United Church Trustees held three meetings in the latter part of 2023, following the completion of the archaeological survey on the designated area around the church. Ownership of the Maple Lake United Church Cemetery will be conveyed to the Township of Algonquin Highlands.

The sale of the Maple Lake United Church has had challenges with rezoning, road allowance, and parking issues. When the church was built in 1901, people travelled mainly by horse and wagon, or on foot, to attend the little white church on the corner at Maple Lake.

There have been two conditional offers submitted to purchase the church and property. The Trustees met on October 27, 2023, with the real estate agents, and agreed to accept one of the offers. Closing date is April 30, 2024.

Most items in the church have either been sold or donated to other United Churches. Some items were donated to the Stanhope Museum to preserve the history of the Maple Lake United Church. Some items have been returned to families who donated them and attended the Maple Lake United Church throughout the years.
